

MINISTRY MESSAGE

Growing in the Springtime!

If you are like me, then you are really looking forward to longer, warmer and drier days. As we approach lent, we begin in winter but end in spring, and perhaps our faith can also follow the rhythm of nature. Lent is an opportunity to make space for God, when we deny ourselves some pleasures to more eagerly seek the Lord. This can be testing and a battle against our own desire for comfort and satisfaction.



There is a real purpose and blessing in self-denial that isn't about religion or self-flagellation! In our struggle in denial, we encounter God's grace and love in ways we would otherwise miss. This is an important, even essential part of our faith as Jesus says in Matthew 16 v 24 :-

Then Jesus told his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. (ESV)

So, if you are looking for growth this springtime, can I encourage you to give something up for lent. Just ask God to help you decide what would be good for you and then trust him when the absence of it makes you long for it more. At least two things will happen. Firstly, you will find that God can meet you in your longing and replace it with himself. Psalm 84 says this:-

1 How lovely is your dwelling place, Lord Almighty!
2 My soul yearns, even faints, for the courts of the Lord;
my heart and my flesh cry out for the living God.
You will find a greater joy in the Lord.

Secondly, you will enjoy that which you gave up so much more than usual. This has been my experience with giving up wine, or food.

Also, this Lent do join in with one of the courses on offer across the Christ our Light congregations. The Lectio course is very good and some of us have done it recently. So, as an alternative, you can come to look at the importance and power of praise in the book of Psalms at St Hilda's. It will focus on meeting God in the wilderness and in a place of abundance.

Whatever you do, go deeper with Jesus this Lent and Easter and discover a greater joy with it.

Yesterday, the 24th January, 20 hardy types met at the Centre for a Church Walk event at Delamere Forest. It was around 7C, with a chill factor down to 2C, and an easterly wind, gusting at 35mph.

Come what may, Penni Conlon's walks continue to attract new walkers, this time we had one of her neighbours join the group, along with her son, who is at University. He probably dropped the average age range of the group considerably.



Although we have done Delamere Forest lots of times, it is still a lovely day out. Because of the numbers, we went straight to the larger venue of Delamere's Forest Café, had our pre walk break then off past "Go Ape" to Blakemere Moss Lake. It's described as a scenic, re-flooded wetland in the heart of Delamere Forest, Cheshire, forming a popular habitat for birds like herons and geese.

Sheltered by the trees, we breezed around the lake, dancing around

walkers, horses, dogs and bicycles as we went.

It was then decision time as to who would settle at the Café and who would tackle Old Pale Hill, described as a 176 metre high "hard" short walk, offering panoramic views of 7 counties.

We were 16 strong this time and went at various paces up the hill. It was still glorious at the top, with the gusting east wind adding an exhilarating twist to the scene.



I gloated to myself coming down, as it's the only time I'm faster than my wife Jane, who had romped up the hill.

We were soon back at the car park marvelling at what a lovely winters day it had been. Thanks' Penni.

Debris in our ditch

There is a long history of problems associated with the drainage of water from the area surrounding the St Nicholas Church car park. It has certainly been a problem as long as I've been here. A silting up of the ditch alongside the car park has been cited as a potential cause of the problem.

Olly Harrison, our local farmer, turned up just before Christmas to tackle the problem. It proved to be a mammoth task and a really dirty job, with tons and tons of debris being lifted out of the ditch with Olly's digger. Along with the silt, were several bicycles, traffic cones, gas bottles and other waste items. On several occasions water began to flood down the ditch as various drainage channels were unblocked. When clearing the excess silt an increased bonus was achieved as two car park spaces were extended by about 3 metres. Olly has a blog on YouTube called "Olly Blogs" and he filmed the episode to show on his blog. His blog has proved to be a very popular thing, as it offers a wonderful window into farming life.

At times like this I realise how lucky we are to have such a strong

church and community link with Olly and his dad Tom. They often help us out with their farming no how, muscle and industrial machinery. A big thank you to both.

14th February – Aspects of Romantic Love

God obviously approves of romance – after all, putting Adam and Eve alone together in the Garden of Eden was His idea.

The history of the Israelites began with three great romances: Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebekah, and Jacob and Rachel. The on-going history of Israel was deeply affected by later romances: Esther and King Xerxes, David's love affair with Bathsheba, and Solomon's marriage to hundreds of foreign wives. There is even an entire book in the Old Testament devoted to human love: the Song of Solomon!

When we reach the New Testament, we find real love between Joseph and Mary (even when Joseph thought Mary had been faithless, he did not want to harm her). St Paul, though himself a bachelor, nevertheless spent a lot of time urging Christians to love and be kind and faithful and considerate to their spouses. He even wrote 1 Corinthians 13 – the great love chapter that is read at millions of weddings worldwide 2000 years later.

Down the centuries ever since, romantic love has been critical in shaping history (Anthony and Cleopatra), in shaping cultural ideals (King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table). Some of our favourite stories are built on romance. (Puccini's *Tosca*, Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet*, Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice*, Charlotte Bronte's *Jane Eyre*.)

Today, romance is still alive and well in Britain – last year we sent about 25 million Valentines to each other.

And what of the future? Well, just as the Bible begins with a love story, so it ends with one. And you are involved! For actually the greatest Love Story of all time is that between God and his people.

Christ is described in Revelation as our heavenly Bridegroom, and the Church is His beloved Bride. He has given us the most expensive present of all – Himself. And, just as in all the best romances, the story will end with the bride and groom getting together at last, so at the End of Time, Christ will return for His Bride.

Winnie the Pooh and Lent 2026

Remember the Winnie the Pooh stories? And Kanga's insistence on Baby Roo's taking his Strengthening Medicine? It's 'really quite a nice taste when you get used to it', she explained, although I'm not convinced Baby Roo always agreed.

It can be helpful to think of Lent as a sort of medicine; an opportunity to strengthen us in the things that are good, rein in other facets of our personality, and reset the compass to the true North of following Jesus. A Spring-clean of the soul, if you like.

Baby Roo (and Piglet on the one occasion he was subject to it) found Strengthening Medicine not to their liking, and we may groan inwardly at the thought of 'giving up something for Lent'. Think of what lies behind this 'giving up'. It's so that we may be strengthened, our character refined, our prejudices examined, our junk thrown overboard, and we may come to Passontide and Easter more fit to walk the way of the Cross, and rise in new life with Jesus at His Resurrection.

Nor is Lent just a case of giving up chocolate. One year I gave up Facebook for Lent, having spent far too much time scrolling through it each day. It freed me to do other, more constructive things. And instead of giving up, why not take up something you've been meaning to do but never got round to; something life-affirming, something good for God.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which this year falls on 18th February. Many Christians go public with their intention to keep a good Lent by being 'ashed' - the sign of the Cross made on the forehead in a mixture of ash and holy oil at a special service that day. The ash is usually the burnt remains of the palm crosses from last year. Having been ashed, the intention of the 40 days of Lent is to maintain a steady course closer to God, symbolised by the giving up of something – like chocolate – which has a hold on us. We walk with Jesus on the way to the Cross, mindful of the 'riches of God's kindness, forbearance and patience' as St Paul has it, and mindful too of Jesus' choice of the Cross as a way for us to enter those riches more fully.

And to face the immensity of that sacrifice, and the immensity of God's riches made available to us in Jesus, we need all the Strengthening Medicine we can get! *Thank you Parish Pump!*

MEN'S GROUP

We had our fifth men's group event and our final one for the year on the 29th November at Delamere Forest.

We met at St Nicholas Centre and car shared to Whitefield Car Park at Delamere. We were pleasantly surprised by fair weather, although the forecast




