

MINISTRY MESSAGE

A few weeks ago, I preached on Luke 5:1-11 and, ever since, I haven't been able to stop thinking about Jesus stepping into Simon-Peter's boat. About how Simon-Peter wasn't expecting anything to change that morning. About how he was tired, worn out from an unproductive night, just going through the motions. And then—Jesus stepped in. Uninvited. Unexpected. And everything changed.

That's how Jesus works, isn't it? He doesn't wait for an invitation. He doesn't ask if we're ready. He steps into our boat—our lives, our routines, our everyday moments—and He speaks. The question is, are we paying attention?

Lent is just around the corner, a season of reflection, of listening, of stripping away distractions. But even before we get there, maybe this is a moment to pause and ask: *Where is Jesus stepping into my life right now?*

We so often look for God in the big moments—the dramatic answers, the life-changing revelations. But more often than not, He speaks in the ordinary. In a conversation at work. In an unexpected encounter at the supermarket. In the quiet pull to reach out to someone who's struggling.

Simon-Peter thought he was just lending Jesus a boat. He had no idea that moment would shift the course of his entire life. What if the same is true for us?

What if the small yes—the simple act of trust, the willingness to listen—is the beginning of something far greater than we can see?

So, let's not miss it. Let's not assume we know how things will go. Let's be people who are awake to the presence of God in the everyday, who expect Jesus to show up in unexpected ways and who, when He speaks, respond with faith:

"Because You say so, I will."

Because when Jesus steps in, everything changes.

A Prayer for Us All

We thank You, Heavenly Father, for the way You step into our lives, even when we least expect it.

Open our eyes to see where You are moving.

Open our hearts to hear where You are calling.

Wherever we are, whatever we do, whoever we are, may we be faithful to Your voice and trust in Your leading.

Guide us by Your Spirit so that, in all things, we may do Your will in the world, in the service of Jesus Christ, and with great joy.

Although the wind was Easterly and the temperature low, we were mostly sheltered by the high banks along the River Mersey. Fortunately, it stayed dry, although an occasional drip from the skies made you wonder whether that would remain the case.





The tide was clearly out with mud banks evident along all the route, but this didn't seem to bother all the Shelducks, Seagulls, Swans, Geese or Pigeons we met along our journey.

Upon arrival at the Catalyst Museum, Becky Conlon couldn't resist another go on their zip wire. Her dad wasn't with us this time, so big John from Springwood made sure she got on safely.

Once inside, John's enquiring mind took over and he asked us what the long word was that was displayed on a banner inside the Museum Café. It read "Saponification" Any ideas?

Apparently, it's the process that converts fats, oils or lipids (the acid) into soap.



Upon our exit, big John wasn't to be outdone by Becky, so he jumped on the



slide, which goes down to the lower level of the grounds. His journey was much slower than Becky's. I'll say no more.

John also has an artistic side and he has shared one of his impressionist paintings, based on Runcorn Bridge, with Penni.

I remember that all the marine bird

life here had to be rescued and re-sited in recent times, when the water dried up. However, it was lovely to see that they had all returned to the area, as numerous, lively, and boisterous as ever.



From there, we walked around their lovely paths, which was a perfect time to see their



snowdrops in abundance. The group then went past the site of the old Transporter Bridge and onto the original Runcorn bridge. Always a great nostalgic trip.

As usual, the return journey to Pickering's seemed much faster than the outward one and we were soon home, with red, rosy, cheeks from all the fresh air.


The World Day of Prayer for this year focuses on the Cook Islands and the service is written by women from the Islands. The theme of the year of prayer is "I made you wonderful"

Over 200 years ago a ship's captain travelled the oceans to discover lands which had never been mapped before. These lands were tiny volcanic islands already named by the indigenous people. Once mapped for the British sponsors, they were named after the explorer as the Cook Islands.

to hear the voices of the women of the Cook Islands with the theme, "I made you wonderful." Psalm 139:14




We extend to you all a warm welcome and hope to see you there.




Beloved apostle to Ireland

St Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. If you've ever been in New York on St Patrick's Day, you'd think he was the patron saint of New York as well... the flamboyant parade is full of American/Irish razzmatazz.

It's all a far cry from the hard life of this 5th century humble Christian who became in time both bishop and apostle of Ireland. Patrick was born the son of a town councillor in the west of England, between the Severn and the Clyde. But, as a young man, he was captured by Irish pirates, kidnapped to Ireland, and reduced to slavery. He was made to tend his master's herds.

Desolate and despairing, Patrick turned to prayer. He found God was there for him, even in such desperate circumstances. He spent much time in prayer, and his faith grew and deepened, in contrast to his



earlier years, when he "knew not the true God". Then, after six gruelling, lonely years he was told in a dream he would soon go to his own country. He either escaped or was freed, made his way to a port 200 miles away and eventually persuaded some sailors to take him with them away from Ireland.

After various adventures in other lands, including near-starvation, Patrick landed on English soil at last, and returned to his family. But he was much changed. He had enjoyed his life of plenty before; now he wanted to devote the rest of his life to Christ. Patrick received some form of training for the priesthood, but not the higher education he really wanted.

But by 435, well-educated or not, Patrick was badly needed. Palladius' mission to the Irish had failed, and so the Pope sent Patrick back to the land of his slavery. He set up his see at Armagh and worked principally in the north. He urged the Irish to greater spirituality, set up a school, and made several missionary journeys.

Patrick's writings are the first literature certainly identified from the British Church. They reveal sincere simplicity and a deep pastoral care. He wanted to abolish paganism, idolatry, and was ready for imprisonment or death in the following of Christ.

Patrick remains the most popular of the Irish saints. The principal cathedral of New York is dedicated to him, as, of course, is the Anglican cathedral of Dublin.

Why should St Joseph's day be in March? Surely, he belongs to Advent and Christmas, at Mary's side in millions of nativity scenes around the world.

In any case, as the foster-father of Christ and husband of Mary, Joseph played a major part in the story of the coming of Jesus Christ. All that we know about him for sure is in the gospels. Read especially Matthew 1 - 2. He was of Davidic descent, but his trade as a carpenter shows that he was not at all wealthy.

Joseph's gentleness and decency towards Mary, and his willingness to do God's will when it was revealed to him, portray him as a kind and godly person. Joseph is the patron saint of fathers of families, and he makes an excellent example. He comes across as a protecting, loyal, thoughtful, self-controlled person, full of integrity, and willing to work hard. Who wouldn't want a father like that?

Joseph is also the patron saint of all who desire a holy death. Thus, countless churches, hospitals and religious congregations are dedicated to Joseph.

Baby Bank St Mary's Halewood - Volunteers needed

Every Saturday Morning at St Mary's, the Shining Light's Baby Bank is open from 10 am - 12 midday providing pre loved baby items (clothes, toys, baby equipment etc) to families with babies and young children, all free of charge.

St Mary's – date and time can be arranged to suit – but Saturday morning when the building is open for Foodbank might be a good day - once a month. *Speak to Gill Dover or Jen Hargreaves.*

Work with children – all roles need a DBS check and safeguarding training. Creche and Junior Church at St Mary's and St Nicholas operate three Sundays a month during term times. Help required on a rota basis.
