

MINISTRY MESSAGE - Going deeper in our relationship with God

"Draw near to God and He will draw near to you" James 4 v8

This is an amazing invitation, but we may think it is impossible. How can I draw near to God? Well, in the following verses it encourages us (probably commands us) to cleanse our hands and purify our hearts. This reminds me of the Psalm that I suggested we could use as a meditation during our prayer day. Psalm 24 asks the question " who may ascend the hill of the lord? Who may stand in his holy place? The one who has clean hands and a pure heart." So, if we desire to get closer to God we need to do a little work on thinking over these things. Of course Lent gives us this opportunity. We give up things so that we might take on more of God.

Sadly, Lent is often seen as a dour time, when we endure our sacrifice as a sort of penance. I think this misunderstands the purpose of our denial.

I'm not suggesting that it isn't difficult, but really the focus should be not on what we are losing out on but rather on the prospect of gain. What would be the gain? Well, put simply, it is a greater capacity to experience the presence and reality of God in our lives. As we demonstrate to the Lord our earnestness in our devotion, it communicates that really nothing is as good as being close to Him.

Psalm 63 and 42 express this in terms of our souls thirsting for God. Can you imagine being in a dry place, a desert on a hot day and being denied the sustenance of water? I remember this whilst being on holiday once in the Mediterranean; the constant sense of being without enough liquid took the edge off what was a great holiday. In the same way, many of us live so far from God that our souls crave his presence. We try to drink from 'other fountains/cisterns' as Jeremiah puts it. We try to satiate our thirst with more things or experiences that this world offers. All these which God gave for our enjoyment, but are never enough to meet our most basic need and that is a close relationship with God.

So if you haven't already done so, can I recommend that you try giving more space to God in your day/week? This is why we have done 24-1 prayer days and the Bible course. These are the prime ways to know the freshness of God's Holy Spirit filling our souls. Of course it is free to know God, but it costs us. For us to remain in this intimate place, we have seek to live according to his word.

We can have too much other stuff to enjoy God, and so we don't make enough time in our day for him and so we miss out and our souls gasp with desperate thirst for him.

As Psalm 24 says, other idols get in the way of this closeness. These things can be other people, our job, not trusting God with our money, and material possessions. It takes faith to lay hold of God and believe that he will satisfy our soul in ways these other things won't. So why not seek to be filled with his Holy Spirit? Make space for God and find out what it is to enjoy him. St Augustine said this "you stir us to take pleasure in praising you, because you have made us for yourself, and our heart is restless until it rests in you". You may want to find a day in which you can fast during lent as this is a good way to start. *Andy*

PARISH WALK

On the morning of Saturday 17th February we met at St Nicholas' Centre for our walk to Greenbank Park, Sudley House and Sefton Park.

After a refreshment stop at Strawberry Field, we drove to Sefton Park, near to the Iron Bridge at the very bottom of Queens Drive. It was a good day for walking, above average temperature and dry and, once parked, we meandered around the perimeter of Sefton Park towards Greenbank Park. We were delighted to welcome Pam and Doug Boffey back to the group. They have organised lots of church walks in the past, but had not been with us for a good while.



Greenbank Park is lovely and that day was no exception. There is a nice feelgood factor there and we quickly passed the lake with the Canada Geese, Pigeons and Seagulls looking for scraps.



Out of the park, we went towards Mossley Hill Church on Rose Lane and we headed towards Sudley House and grounds. We

walked up the driveway past an array of purple and white crocus and then to the rear of the grand old house.

Sudley House was built in1821 by Liverpool Corn Merchant Nicholas Robinson. He had bought the land it stands on, some 30 acres, for £4,500. The Robinsons described



themselves as lvory merchants; however, there were slave trade implications.

The Holts, shipping magnates, later bought it and, in 1944, Emma Holt, their daughter, bequeathed Sudley House and estate to Liverpool Corporation.



Once into the grounds we did a lap of the estate and then took up residence at the rear of the house, where we got our halfway snacks and drinks out.

From there we went back to Sefton Park and were drawn to their fantastic lake. Becky Conlon bought several bird seed bags from the café and we all went off feeding the wildlife, one of my favourite pursuits.





We arrived back at the cars with about 5 miles under our belt and we were thankful that the rain forecasted had not yet started. Great planning again Penni.

We are streaming Sunday and Thursday morning services live and it is also available for you to watch later. You may wish to make use of this if you are unable to attend church in person for any reason.


If you subscribe to our YouTube Channel (It's free) it will make it easier to access in future.

The Coventry Passion Cross

"He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities, the chastisement that bought us peace was upon Him and by His stripes we are healed." Isaiah 53:4-6

Coventry Cathedral uses as its emblem the Coventry Passion Cross – three nails together forming the Cross of Christ. Here is my reflection on the Coventry Passion Cross; what does this design mean to you?_

The first nail is the carpenter's nail and focuses us on the purpose of the nail. We are reminded that Jesus worked as a carpenter before



entering His ministry. As He sat there in His carpenter's workshop, smoothing and working the wood with love, did He contemplate the rugged cross on which He would one day be crucified? As He hammered nails into wood, did He ever accidentally hammer one into His finger, and as He felt that pain, did He foresee the nails of His crucifixion? As He carried large logs to His workshop to make tables, chairs, and doors, did He contemplate the cross he would one day carry to Calvary?

The second nail is the nail of *Passion*, it represents the nails in Jesus' hands and feet that He accepted because of His passionate love for us.

The third nail is the nail of Promise, like the promise He made to the dying thief on the cross. It was that if we believe in Him, then we will reign with Him in paradise. This is the nail that Christ offers to you and to me. Will you accept this nail as a sign of His passionate love, His forgiveness of your sin and promise of eternal life for all who will come to Him? If so, why not pray the following prayer this Eastertide?

<u>Pray</u>

Dear Lord Jesus, thank You that You have a plan and a purpose for my life, thank You for Your passionate love for me, thank You that Your blood was shed for my sins, thank You for Your promise of eternal life. As I think about that nail of promise, I receive Your passion, Your grace and Your forgiveness, may I fulfil Your plan and purpose for my life, In Jesus name, Amen.

St James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

Visits from your parishioners to our church are always welcome. But I did not expect them to return to you complaining because our pews are uncomfortable.

Pews are *meant* to be uncomfortable. The unshakeable belief of our congregation is that the more uncomfortable the pew, the holier the worship must be. By the same token, an 8am Service is more fervent than one at 11am, since it is much more socially inconvenient. If you add on enduring sub-zero temperatures and damp, then sainthood clearly beckons. Your people may be used to lolling in upholstered chairs in tropical temperatures, but I am sure such comfort places their souls in grave peril.

Our pews were built 500 years ago, when people were several inches shorter and many pounds lighter, and so could accommodate themselves on them perfectly adequately. The fact that a twenty-first century body is in constant danger of sliding off the seat and requires knees to be folded somewhere near ears at least helps to keep minds focussed – apart from Colonel Wainwright, who still manages to sleep peacefully throughout Mattins every Sunday.

I could point out that your chairs make kneeling almost impossible – although I suspect that posture is not encouraged in your church, as people would then be unable to read the words on your overhead projector or wave their arms about quite as easily during the hymns. While the majority of our congregation find the Anglican crouch perfectly adequate, you can see those who flop to their knees on hearing "let us pray" from the clouds of dust sent up from suddenly compressed hassocks, which were purchased to commemorate Queen Victoria's Accession.

I may also point out that our box pews are very useful for modern times. Once a family is seated, with the door firmly shut, then any toddler is penned in and unable to use the aisles as a racing circuit. Medieval carpenters were clearly forward-thinking people. Admittedly, box pew doors do tend to stick, and few manage to look dignified while they wait for step ladders to be brought before they can climb out.

If only you would remove your chairs and substitute benches without backs, turn off all heating and replace carpets with slate slabs, I am sure your congregation's religious zeal would soar.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR VOLUNTEERING

Both of our churches rely on the generosity of members of our congregation in giving up their time to volunteer in all kinds of ways. At St Nicholas and St Mary's we are very blessed with the number of volunteers we do have but there is always room for more.
